Preface

This book Gorkhaland: The Dormant Volcano, is a comprehensive account and searching analysis of the resurgent Gorkhaland agitation when it was at its peak. Mr. Subas Ghising the leader of the erstwhile Gorkha National Liberation Front (GNLF) movement and the uncrowned monarch of the hills was thrown out by his own comrades and the Darjeeling Gorkha Hill Council which was formed in 1988 was rejected. The new movement was led by Bimal Gurung and his new party, the Gorkha Janamukti Morcha (GJMM) with the renewed demand for a separate state. The hills were turbulent with the air of violence and despite repeated rounds of talk no peace agreement was possible. After about one year the entire political scenario of the state went topsy-turvy with the cataclysmic fall of the Left Front Government in the Assembly elections of 2011 and the installation of the coalition of the Trinamool Congress Party and the Indian National Congress Party at the helm of affairs. This had its far reaching repercussions on the Gorkhaland movement and the agreement between the centre, the state and the GJMM which had proved elusive till then, became a reality in July 2011 with the new promise of peace and development. The prospects of peace have received periodic setbacks but till date, the agreement has endured. The book has been updated with the latest developments.

The present book is the product of the findings of the UGC Major Research Project entitled *The Gorkhaland Agitation: Emergence and Resurgence: A Study in Crisis Management* which was undertaken by me as Principal Investigator in February 2010. I must begin by thanking the University Grants Commission for sanctioning and sponsoring this research project without which, the book would not have seen the light of the day.

I had to undertake a number of trips to the hills and interview the leaders of the GJMM movement as well as those of opposition parties like All India Gorkha League (AIGL), GNLF, Communist Party of Revolutionary Marxists (CPRM), etc., to acquaint myself with their changing response to the rapidly changing political landscape. I found all Gorkha leaders extremely helpful and cooperative. The very fact that I had undertaken a Research Project on the Gorkha filled them with satisfaction and they extended their unfailing help to me. I am particularly indebted to Smt.
